
Thank you!

Athletic Hall of Fame 2019 by Cam Stadtmueller

The 2019 induction ceremony for the Harbor Creek Athletic Hall of Fame began with the unveiling of plaques honoring recipients. This fifth class of inductees reflected a wide variety of high school athletes, including Douglas Moorhead (1952), William DeDionisio (1963), Sarah Klancer Dayak (1996), Justin Blose (2000), Taylor Hilinski (2006), and the 1980-1981 Varsity Boys Basketball Team.

Doug Moorhead was outstanding in football, basketball and baseball. He also ran track and field events not sponsored by the school district and went on to be a cross country and track star at Penn State University.

Bill DeDionisio was honored as a three-sport athlete who excelled in football, basketball, and track and field. During his years teaching at Harbor Creek, Bill coached and assisted with four different teams, spending 19 years with football, basketball, and track and field, and serving as the head boys golf coach for five years.

Bringing soccer into prominence as a premier Harbor Creek sport was Sarah Klancer Dayak. She led the girls soccer team to county league titles during her four seasons. In track and field, Sarah set school records that still remain for girls' 1,600 and 3,200-meter relays.

Football, wrestling, and track and field were the sports in which Justin Blose excelled. Justin modeled dedication and team spirit while serving as captain of the 1999 football team and as captain of the wrestling team for the 1998/99 and 1999/2000 seasons. Among the many honors Justin received while in school were medals in track and field and wrestling from the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA). He went on to compete in pole vault at Edinboro University, and he has coached football and track and field for 12 years at Fort LeBoeuf High School.

After excelling in girls soccer during her high school years, Taylor Hilinski returned to Harbor Creek as a science teacher and has coached the girls soccer team for the past five years. Taylor earned single-season and career records for girls soccer while serving as team captain in her senior year, when the Huskies finished as District 10 runner-up. During high school, she competed in cross country and swimming, and was the 2006 team captain for track and field.

Well-known boys basketball coaches Lee Palloto, Joe Sholtis, and Paul Moneta inspired the talented 1980-1981 boys basketball team to win the first 27 games of the season. They secured Harbor Creek's first District 10 Championship Title. In the PIAA quarter finals, the 15-member team defeated Clairton High School after four overtime periods, but they lost to Carlynton in the PIAA Western Finals.

Harborcreek Native Crowned 2019 Pennsylvania Grape Queen By Cam Stadtmueller

Madeline Curtis was crowned the 2019 Pennsylvania Grape Queen in North East on September 19th as part of the North East Community Fair. Madeline is the daughter of Kori Sul Curtis (Class of 1993) and the late Steven Curtis (Class of 1989). She is also the granddaughter of Harbor Creek graduates Shelia Waite Sul and Jim Sul.

Madeline will have a full schedule of events as the Grape Queen. She is currently a duel enrolled Senior, attending PSU Behrend in the morning and Harbor Creek High School in the afternoon. Madeline is a member of the National Honor Society and a four-year Scholar Athlete with High Honors. Her athletic accomplishments encompass the three varsity sports of cross country, track, and swimming. She has been a state qualifying athlete six times, and she hopes to increase that to eight by the end of May 2020. This November, Curtis ranked 21st in the State Class 2A Girls Cross Country Race at Hershey Park.

Harborcreek Business Men's Association

In 1949, Harborcreek business owners, school personnel, farmers, and township residents came together to form an association. They chose the name Harborcreek Business Men's Association and filed Articles of Incorporation for the new entity on March 13, 1950 in the court of Common Pleas of Erie County, Pennsylvania. The goal of the organization was to improve the community through public service volunteerism.

In May of this year (2019), three historical society members - Sherman Clark, Nancy Brown, and Carol Laughlin - discussed the organization and recalled the following details.



Highlights of Harborcreek History by Cam Stadtmueller

During 2019, the Harborcreek Historical Society's 25th anniversary year, the newsletter team would like to share with you the history of the township through a series of 'articles' formatted as a timeline. The following article is the first of three.

- **1884** *History of Erie County, Pennsylvania* by Warner, Beers and Co. was published, and it described Harborcreek Township as one of the wealthiest and populace places in Erie County. The houses and barns were "neat and schools were unusually good."
- **1898-1944** Knoll's Hotel located between Route 20 and the New York Central Railroad tracks was popular with railroad passengers, travelers on Rte. 20, and local residents. Today, it is known as the Fiddle Inn restaurant.
- **1901** The first street car line connected Erie to Harborcreek (fare \$.10), and Erie to North East (fare \$.20). Street car service ended in January 1933.
- **1903** Central School located on Iroquois Avenue opened welcoming students in Grades 1 through 12. Its first graduating class was 1907.
- **1906** Harborcreek Township's Gospel Hill area was home to many African American families, such as the McConnell, Jackson, and Titus descendants.



Penn State University Press Publishes History of Behrend's Glenhill Farm

Written by Richard L. Hart, Director Emeritus of the John M. Lilley Library at Penn State Behrend, *Glenhill Farm* details the story of the Behrend family estate as revealed in the correspondence between the architect, R. Brognard Okie and Ernst and Mary Behrend.

By 1930, having developed a highly successful business, the innovative paper manufacturer Ernst Behrend and his wife Mary purchased a number of existing houses and farms to give them sufficient acreage to create a large estate. In 1948 this property became a campus of Penn State University. Known as Penn State Behrend, to this day it retains the original buildings at the historic center of the campus.

Based on archival materials, including copious letters between the Behrends and their Philadelphia architect, R. Brognard Okie, this book recounts the planning and development of a unique residence.

Letters between the key figures give the reader a glimpse into their thoughts and concerns, including the selection of an architect, the choice of an architectural style, issues involved in planning the estate, and the features and design of the buildings that were constructed or modified. Vintage and modern photographs help convey the nature of the buildings that Okie designed as well as a sense of the Behrends' lifestyle in the 1930s.

An absorbing micro-history of what is now Behrend College, *Glenhill Farm* provides a window onto a period when new money from industry supported lavish lifestyles, and it reveals how this particular project, conceived and constructed during the Great Depression, was affected by its extraordinary economic circumstances.


