Mercyhurst students help create interpretive panels


Four students enrolled in Mercyhurst University's Introduction to Historic Preservation course last fall helped develop text and select photographs for two new interpretive panels celebrating Harborcreek's history.

Molly Kennedy and Gretchen Evan worked with Society President Lori Sheridan on a panel highlighting the Russell Log Cabins. As the first tourism business in Harborcreek, Russell Log Cabins provided travelers an opportunity for some relaxation. With a restaurant, dance hall, gas station, and a motel, the location became a popular stop from the early 1900s until the late 1940s. The open field in front of the Harborcreek Township Building was once a full service rest stop with 21 rentable log cabins.

Once complete, the panel will be installed next to the freestanding fireplace that is all that remains of the Russell Log Cabins.

A panel about Hoag Cemetery (also known as Backus Cemetery) and the most recent restoration project at the cemetery was designed by Philip Jenny and Erin Webster with the help of Nancy Brown, Robin Cuneo, Judy Ellwood, and Lori Sheridan.

The panels, which are currently being proofread and edited by Society volunteers, will be fabricated and installed later this year. The project is funded in part by a Community Asset Grant from the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority awarded to Erie Yesterday and eight historical organizations, including the Harborcreek Historical Society.

Presently, the Society maintains interpretive panels at Gospel Hill Burial Ground, Roadside Park (about the Gauge War), Shades Beach, and the Gifford-Blanchfield House.



Let the bird watching begin!

The Society would like to thank Roger Pierce and John Skuce for building and installing a blue bird house on the grounds of the Gifford-Blanchfield House. Last fall, the Township removed a large storage building located between the parking lot of the house and the corn fields. The bird house is a welcome addition to the now vacant lot.


Highlights of Harborcreek History by Cam Stadtmueller

During 2019, the Harborcreek Historical Society's 25th anniversary year, the newsletter team would like to share with you the history of the township through a series of 'articles' formatted as a timeline. The following article is the first of three.

- 1795 General William Irvine selected land near the mouth of Six Mile Creek. Irvine's Reserve extended south as far as a line parallel to what is Firman Road today. Harborcreek Historical Society is located in the Gifford Blanchfield House, which was built on the Irvine Reserve property.
- 1797 The sloop *Washington* was constructed at the mouth of Four Mile Creek. It is believed to be the oldest confirmed commercial sailing ship to exist on the Great Lakes and the first to sail in Lakes Erie and Ontario. It was financed by the Pennsylvania Population Company. and construction was supervised by Epipaulet Beebe.



- 1802 Thomas Rees, a surveyor and land agent for the Pennsylvania Population Company, selected acreage from Six Mile Creek west to what is today the Gospel Hill area. He established his residence and farms near the crest of Hannon Road. A stone springhouse that is visible on the property today is thought to be the oldest structure in the township.
- 1803 Erie County was divided up into 16 townships, one of which was Harborcreek Township. The township quickly developed the following villages: Harbor Creek, Moorheadville, Clark Settlement, Wesleyville, and Boscobel.



- 1812 A post office was established at Moorheadville.
- 1815 William Saltsman built a sawmill in the gulley on Four Mile Creek. In 1826, he added a grist mill. The area of Saltsman's mills is now known as the Cooper Road area. The Gospel Hill Methodist Church, built on Station Road, began this same year.
- 1816 Neely bought Dobbin's Mill on Twelve Mile Creek and ships locally milled flour to Buffalo. After 1825, flour was shipped via the Erie Canal for destinations on the East Coast.
- 1823 The Gospel Hill Burial Ground was founded and located on Station Road. Land for the burial ground was donated by the Rees Family.
- 1832 The Presbyterian Church started in the Village of Harborcreek. A post office was established in the Village this same year. The township was spelled 'Harbourcreek.'
- 1841 South Harborcreek Methodist Church was founded at Davison and McGill Roads.
