# Veterans Tribute: Remembering World War I by Cam Stadtmueller

The North East Historical Society offers you the opportunity to learn more about the many local men and women who were involved in World War I - 100 years ago - overseas and on the home front in *WWI 1914 – 1918: Great War of Democracy*, an extensive display of photographs and artifacts. The exhibit is located in the Society's museum, which is located at 25 Vine Street in the old town hall.

Many of the enlistees from North East became members of Company G of the 16<sup>th</sup> Regiment. They trained at Camp Hancock, GA before joining the American Expeditionary Forces in Western Europe. One harrowing section of the exhibit talks about the 17 boys from North East who died while in training camps or battle.



The exhibit also presents information about residents who supported troops from the home front. Boy Scouts in Gibson Park sold Liberty Bonds and Stamps. Campfire Girls collected maple sap from trees in Gibson Park and elsewhere to help with the sugar shortage and to sell as maple syrup with profits going to the American Red Cross. Women over 16 proved their willingness to work in local factories and processing plants by signing up on Women's Registration Days, November 1 & 2, 1917.

You can visit the World War I exhibit June through December during the North East Historical Society's open hours, which are Fridays and Saturdays 4:30 pm to 8:30 pm, or groups by appointment. 





## Harborcreek's First March Madness by Harold L. Kirk

This article was written by the late Harold L. Kirk as part of his series of over 50 narratives entitled Tales and Treasures of Harborcreek Township. Fast Forward to the 2016-17 basketball season for Harbor Creek and you will learn that the Huskies have won 18 and lost 7 before the PA State Playoffs. The Lady Huskies are at 19 wins and 6 losses before the State Playoffs on March 11<sup>th</sup>. What a difference since 1913!

March came in like a Lion and went out like a "GATOR," as another March Madness season came to an end. Some people were sad while others were glad, including those that were happy that "JEOPARDY" would not be pre-empted by another play-off game.

I don't know how many Harbor Creek basketball players have gone on to play college ball but with the help of an old High School yearbook, I was able to identify Harbor Creek's first basketball team!

As reported in the 1913 yearbook, that team lined up on December 27th for their first game. That game saw the students pitted against a team made up of former students and was referred to as "The Alumni Game." The school at that time had a big disadvantage as it had no basketball court. I don't know where the game was played but it is noted in the yearbook that the team also had no place to hold practice sessions. The students won that first game but were unable to line up another game until the following March. On March 14th the team journeyed to East Millcreek, where they played the High School five of that place. Following is an account of the game.

On account of our lack of practice they had the idea that they could take the game at any score. Nonomague scored first, followed soon afterward by Shaner, then by Nonomague again. About this time East Millcreek began to think that something was doing and commenced to yell, "We've given them a start so now let's tighten down and show them what we can do." Kohl put this into practice by connecting for a field goal. Pierce ended the first half by making a basket on a "held ball" tip off. The second half started off with some good team work on the part of Millcreek, but the good work of our guards soon broke it up and turned it to account in the form of a field goal by Pierce. Long broke the ice for Millcreek, and with the help of their umpire they scored two points on fouls, but to no avail for Nonomague and Shaner connected up for one apiece, ending the game in a dispute about Shaner's basket. But the referee decided that it was fair and awarded the game to Harbor Creek with the score of twelve to six.

And so it was that Harborcreek's first basketball team went undefeated. "March Madness indeed!"
