6:30 pm at the Gifford-Blanchfield House

Organized by volunteers Larry Beard and Nancy Brown, "Tuesday Talks" provide an opportunity for people to gather, learn about, and discuss local places, happenings, and families. Each Tuesday Talk focuses on a different topic.

Sears kit homes will be the subject of our next "Tuesday Talk" July 26th. From 1908 to 1940, Sears, Roebuck and Company marketed, sold, and shipped approximately 100,000 kit houses in the U.S. Called "Modern Homes," they ranged from 4-room bungalows with no bath to 14-room, two-family homes with two baths. There are several Sears houses in Harborcreek, and the Harborcreek Historical Society would like to document them.

How can you tell if you have a Sears kit house? Look for stamped lumber in the basement or attic.

Sears Modern Homes were kit homes, and the framing members were stamped with a letter and a number to help with assembly. Look for shipping labels on the back of millwork. Check blueprints and other house documents for mention of Sears. Compare the home to images of available kits in the Sears catalogs.

Gulch or Gulf by Nancy Brown

During our June 14th presentation on Factory Gulch, the question once again was asked, "Is it Factory Gulch or Factory Gulf?" About two thirds of the audience said "gulch," while the remainder of the group said "gulf." After I returned home, I thought of a way to find out - once and for all - what was correct.

I have an old dictionary, copyrighted 1916, which has helped tremendously when I have run into archaic words in the Dodge family journals - words like enface, vendue, and stag (not a deer).

Perhaps it could solve the problem! IT DID.

According to the dictionary, a gulf is an inlet from an ocean or sea frequently creating a whirlpool. A gulch is a deep ravine created by a raging torrent. While I would not call Six Mile Creek a raging torrent these days, its water was much higher in years gone by and there have been several historic floods. It provided the waterpower for the Cass Woolen Mill from 1844 to 1886, which was located on Depot Road south of I-90. People hiking in Six Mile Creek Park have seen remnants of the foundations of the former mills in the gulch.

I think you will agree that the proper names for Harborcreek's landmarks are Factory Gulch and Cooper's Gulch, too.

We hope that you join us for the July 26th Tuesday Talk, which will begin our exploration of Sears kit houses in Harborcreek Township.

We know what it is!

The spring issue of *The Harbor View* included a photograph taken at Shorewood Beach by Harborcreek Township Supervisor Steve Oler. It featured a wooden frame situated on the bank of Twelve Mile Creek. We asked you to help identify what it is, and you did.

The wooden frame is what is left of an old suspension foot bridge that once crossed Twelve Mile Creek and provided access to cottages on the east side of the creek. It was gated and locked to prevent unwanted guests from accessing the cottages.

Zielinski Secret by Jane Ingold

Edward and Theresa Zielinski had a funny “meet-cute” story and an even cuter honeymoon story. In the late 40s Theresa Miaczynski was working in the refrigeration department of General Electric as an evaporator tester where the department’s repairman, Edward Zielinski, caught her eye. She spoke to him often because she would purposely make mistakes that required his expertise to fix.

The pair married on August 4, 1951. After they wed Theresa wrote a letter to the producers of the television game show *I've Got a Secret* to suggest that Ed be invited to appear. Ed's secret? He went on his honeymoon with 58 women. The story was deemed a good fit for the show, and the couple was flown to New York City where they were treated to a hotel stay and tickets to a club.

Here's how Ed happened to find himself in such an unusual situation. When they heard that the General Electric Secretaries Club, in cooperation with Worldwide Travel Service, was sponsoring a trip to Bermuda starting just nine days after their wedding, the newlyweds purchased the last two spaces. Their flight left on Monday, August 13th which was the start of GE's second week of summer shutdown. The trip included accommodations at the Hotel St. George in St. George's Parish as well as champagne, dancing, a beach party, and options to take a bicycling trip or a moonlight cruise. Bags were given as gifts to the ladies and sunglasses to the men. They were advised to carry their birth certificates with them, so that they could return to the US on Saturday, August 18th.

The panel for the show the week that Ed appeared included Bill Cullen, Jayne Meadows, Eddie Bracken, and Kitty Carlisle and the featured celebrity guest was gossip columnist Elsa Maxwell. The game allowed each panelist to ask questions until a buzzer sounded at which time the contestant earned \$10. Once it was clear that the secret involved a trip with many women, the panelists' questions led to raucous laughter from the audience who were always in on the secret:

“Did you all do the same thing when you got there? Did they go along with you to watch you do something? Did you teach them anything? Did you use any portion of your body to do this?” During Bill Cullen’s second round of questions, he had an epiphany: “Was this trip to celebrate something like an anniversary? Oh no.... I just thought of something. This couldn’t have been a hon...was this a honeymoon?”

Ed was on screen a total of six minutes, and he won \$40.

The episode aired on October 23, 1952. That night the television station called to let the Zielinskis know that the show would be pre-empted due to some news related to the upcoming local election. Edward was a member of the GE Quarter Century Club, retiring after 29 years. He was 89 when he passed away on January 23, 2002. Theresa passed away on Sunday, May 31, 2009, at the age of 80. After leaving GE, she worked for 20 years at Behrend. They rest together at Mount of Olives Cemetery and were survived by three sons John, James, and Mark.

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Highlights of Harborcreek History


In 2019, the Harborcreek Historical Society's 25th anniversary year, the newsletter team began sharing the history of the township through a series of 'articles' formatted as a timeline. The following article is the eleventh installment.

1980s – 1990s: The growth and development of multiple subdivisions increased the township's population. They included: Chriswood (1983), renamed Northview Heights, south of Cooper Road; Hoover Heights (1984), west of upper Davison Road; further development of Marshall Bell property into Dominion Drive (1985), east of Saltsman Road in Brookside; Walton Woods Phase 1 (1988), north of East Lake Road in Fairfield; Fox Hollow (1989), north of East Lake Road in Fairfield; Foxwood (1990), south of Cooper Road, grows to include 150 homes; and Bernwood (1994), west of lower Saltsman Road.


1991: Summerfest Celebration began at the municipal building as a community festival. The popularity of the event in '91 and '92 proved a larger venue was needed. It was renamed Harborfest and moved to Firman Fields on Clark Road, now Harborcreek Community Park. Thousands of residents were drawn to the event, which featured hot air balloons, amusement rides, vendors and food trucks, a marketplace for artisans and crafters, informational booths, live music, and the Miss Harborfest pageant. The Thursday through Sunday mid-July event attracted around 25,000 people. In 2004, an abnormal amount of rainfall saturated Firman Fields and caused amusement rides and vendor trucks to be trapped in deep mud. The Chamber of Commerce and Township officials discussed changes for Harborfest in 2005, but the event was permanently canceled.

1994: Harborcreek Historical Society began with its Articles of Incorporation being filed in Harrisburg in June. By November, the first Directors' meeting took place in the Reed Building at Penn State Behrend. Judy Wiczorek was elected President, replacing Beth Simmons, Vice President was Donna Mindek, Treasurer was Delores Hickernell, and Secretary was Linda Marker. First board members included Attorney Richard Cowell, Rodney Haynes, Ben Lane, and Virginia McGarvey. "The purpose of the society is to promote awareness of the history and heritage of the Harborcreek area and its environs and to encourage the identification, collection, and preservation of materials for those purposes."

1996: All roads in the township were paved with concrete, asphalt, or tar and chip rolled surfaces. No more dirt roads!

Archives project moves ahead

We announced earlier in the year that the Harborcreek Historical Society was awarded grant funding through the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority and the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission for projects relating to the collections. Archives consultant Bryan Colvin, who is the University & Ridge Archivist for Mercyhurst University, has completed an assessment of the archives and prepared a report with suggested actions. Implementation of the recommendations will begin in July with the purchase of necessary equipment and supplies and continue into August with the hiring of a student intern who will process and digitize select materials. Digitization efforts will focus on the Dodge Family Collection, which includes personal journals and correspondence and financial ledgers and other business records dating from 1841 to the 1920s relating to the family of John Dodge, Sr.

Erie Gives Day
