Follow up on the old Log Cabin By Jane Ingold

Thanks to all who responded to our request for more information about the recently demolished Log Cabin east of the subway which was the original home of the Harborcreek Athletic Association. The first mention of the HAA in the Erie paper was a February 26, 1931 notice which announced that the Association was sponsoring a dance at town hall. The planning committee consisted of James Hill, Lawrence Adams, and Kenneth Neff with music by the Jack Norris Rhythm Kings. At that point the group held its meetings at the Harborcreek Fire Hall. In October of that year, they hosted their first annual coon and hound trials. At some point before 1937 the group built the familiar log cabin which they called their "clubhouse." Two years later Eliza "Rusty" Keene was elected president of the auxiliary. A nurse by training, she was one of the many cooks who helped put on the specialty dinners over the years featuring fish, steak, or ham. Their dinners and dances benefited many organizations such as the March of Dimes and the Harborcreek Fire Department which bought gas masks with the proceeds in 1943.

Meanwhile, Rusty's husband, Emmett, a crane operator who worked at "the GE" and was known to most as Pete, took care of several aspects of the venue. Besides stamping hands at the door, he managed the books and took on many maintenance tasks including caring for the floors using oiled sawdust and working with a broom until they gleamed. His daughter Karen remembers roller skating there with her friends. She recalls that the "square dances were very jolly and there was always some sort of countrified gentleman who

would call the dances. They had live music and the bandleader was Hugh Harrity." She also remembers dancing the polka with a young man they called "JoeJoe" or "JoJo," but his last name is now forgotten.

The Keenes' elder daughter, Loralee, was privileged to have as a best friend, Diane Grenz Baumgardner, who recalls the good times they had at the dances. "I recall when the trains went by, we just had to stop talking because it was so loud. Their house was very close to traffic and of course there was no air conditioning then and we had the windows open."

The clubhouse was the site of many banquets including some for Harbor Creek alumni and Our Lady of Mercy Altar Society. In his memoir Growing Up In Harborcreek, PA, George Pierce, Jr., whose parents recalled that he and his bride Doris Witherow Pierce held their wedding reception there in January 1950. On our Facebook page, Renee Newberry noted that she attended her niece's bridal shower at the facility.

Other Facebook commenters included Linda DeAngelo who told us that her husband Bob attended Scout meetings there. Pam Yates, Carol Langdon, and Wendy Roman Cabrera enjoyed auctions there run by local fireman Garth May in the 1970's. A 1972 notice in the classifieds for an auction there advertised clothing, food, and toys and listed Tom Sterrett of Fairview as that night's auctioneer. Finally, A.J. Learn used to race remotecontrolled cars at the property. We are grateful for all of those who shared their memories with us.

On August 9, 1968 a classified notice announced the dissolution of the Harborcreek Athletic Association and, as noted in our last issue, the Gem City Gun Club and the Institute of Tae Kwon Do later owned the property.

"Duck and cover" By Melinda Meyer

In reorganizing the basement storage for the Harbor Creek School District's senior high school, staff recently rediscovered relics of a by-gone era, a time when the threat of nuclear war felt imminent...and, yet, survivable with the right preparation.

The items staff found were labeled "CIVIL DEFENSE HOSP." and dated 1952, with at least one item having a sticker from the American Red Cross Erie, PA Chapter. To understand why this collection of cots, pillows, wool blankets, and 10-gallon milk dispensers was strategically placed in the basement of the school, it is important to consider world and national happenings at the time. Taken from the "Civil Defense and Homeland Security: A Short History of National Preparedness Efforts" published in 2006 by the Homeland Security National Preparedness Task Force:

The climate of civil defense changed dramatically with the successful Soviet test of a nuclear weapon in August of 1949. The United States lost its monopoly on nuclear weapons and the corresponding negotiating power that this entailed. Local officials began to demand from the Federal government a clear outline of what they were to do in crisis situations.

In response, Congress enacted the Federal Civil Defense Act of 1950, which placed most of the civil defense burden on the States and created the Federal Civil Defense Administration (FCDA) to formulate national policy to guide the States' efforts. The FCDA led shelter building programs, sought to improve Federal and State coordination, established an attack warning system, stockpiled supplies, and started a well known national civic education campaign. The FCDA specifically aimed to teach schoolchildren about preparedness, primarily through civil defense drills. In order to effectively educate the entire youth population, the FCDA commissioned a movie studio to produce nine civil defense movies that would be shown in classrooms across the nation - among them Duck and Cover. The movie, through its main character Bert the Turtle, showed children what to do when they saw

"the flash of an atomic bomb." Ultimately, the film was seen by millions of schoolchildren during the 1950s. The public education campaign throughout the decade promoted the idea that with preparation, a nuclear attack could be survivable.

Locally, the Erie County Civil Defense organization kicked into action in 1951, with an initial \$53,000 budget approved by county council, half coming from the federal government. By 1952, plans were in place for air raid warning sirens to be placed in North East, Girard, Waterford, Union City, Albion, Corry, and Edinboro, and the first mass volunteer enlistment drive aimed at recruiting air raid wardens took place in November of that year. As part of the campaign, which mirrored a similar national effort, enlistment displays were placed in the storefronts of the Boston Store, Trask's, P.A. Meyers, and Isaac Baker and Sons. By February 1954, the total number of volunteer members of the Erie County Civil Defenses corps was 1,200.

Highlights of Harborcreek History By Cam Stadtmueller

In 2019, the Harborcreek Historical Society's 25th anniversary year, the newsletter team began sharing the history of the township through a series of 'articles' formatted as a timeline. The following article is the thirteenth installment.

2004-05: World War II veterans and Harborcreek residents Joe Lesniewski and Spencer Wurst spoke at the Harborcreek Historical Society twice, enthralling audiences both times with their accounts of military missions. Joe served with the Easy Company of the 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division, which dropped soldiers behind enemy lines following the D-day invasion of Normandy. The story of E Company was told in both the *Band of Brothers* book and miniseries.

Spencer published a memoir of his combat missions as "Descending from the Clouds." A member of the 505th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 82d Airborne Division, Spencer was dropped into an area of fighting around the Normandy region of Sainte Mere Eglise and fought in the Ardennes Campaign (Battle of the Bulge).

2006: In June, the Harbor Creek School District held its 100th Annual Commencement on the stage of the Warner Theatre. One hundred and forty-five students from the Class of 2006 received their diplomas, with several providing words of inspiration. In contrast, with seven women and four men giving speeches, the 1907 commencement was held at Central School Auditorium in May.


2007: On October 19th, a ribbon cutting ceremony was held to celebrate completion of Phase 2 improvements at Shades Beach, a \$2.6 million offshore marina. The beach provides boaters with a launching area, as well as a breakwall shelter from Lake Erie's waves. Park visitors can walk along the breakwall, which originally contained a railed fishing area for the handicapped.

2008: On Depot Road north of Interstate 90, John Schaefer began construction of the first houses and patio homes of the Harbor Ridge Golf Community. A 9-hole golf course encircles the residences and a clubhouse / restaurant providing indoor and outdoor views of Lake Erie. Today, there are approximately 150 homes and four condominiums, with more being added each year.

2008: The Walmart Plaza is built on Buffalo Road. Shoppers entering the plaza from Route 20 do so on Gifford Drive. The township chose this name because the development borders property once owned by the Gifford Family. In 1836 Gershom and Lucy Gifford purchased 120 acres of Irvine's Reserve, built their home, raised cattle, and farmed. The last Gifford family descendent to own the property were Gerald and Bette Blanchfield and their son Rick. Today, the plaza houses Walmart, Bob Evans Restaurant, and Erie Bank and includes acreage for future growth.

2008: Behrend College opened in 1948 as a one-year school affiliated with Penn State and, over 60 years, developed into a vibrant campus with four-year programs. Growing out from the historic Glenhill Farmhouse, the campus has become an impressive complex. The school is now one of Penn State's largest branches, attracting students and faculty from all over the world.

2010: Harborcreek Township's population grew by 2,000 new residents between the 2000 (15,178 people) and 2010 (17,234 people) U.S. Censuses.

An update on the archives project

Society volunteers continue to make improvements for the benefit of the collections. The Gifford-Blanchfield House has large 20 windows. They let in an amazing amount of natural light, but sunlight is a common source of ultraviolet light, which can cause irreparable damage to all works on paper, photographs, library and archive collections, museum objects, leathers, and fabrics.

Purchased last fall and installed this January by volunteers Cindy and Ken Duda, all 20 windows now feature light-blocking shades. The shades will help in controlling the internal building temperature, as well.

Last summer, under the supervision of Bryan Colvin, who is the University & Ridge Archivist for Mercyhurst University, student Eva Phillips organized the Dodge Family collection and began digitizing the collection using Preservica digital archives software.

The work in the collections is being supported in part with grant funding from the Erie County Gaming Revenue Authority and the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission.
